"Beautiful Flowers"



A few weeks ago while watching *Family Feud* on TV, the survey question was "Name a common spring flower." The contestant quickly answered during the "Fast Money" round, "Dandelion." If you are a fan on Steve Harvey and *Family Feud*, you can probably imagine the laughter that instantly began as Steve reacted to the answer.

I have been thinking about that dandelion answer as I have witnessed the wildflowers blooming this Spring in Montana. Since this is my first Montana wildflower season, I have been quite intrigued by each flower. I wonder often what the name of each flower

might be and if they bloom in a variety of areas. I wonder how long the blossoms last and if they are truly a flower or a flowering weed.

Dandelions are certainly bright and beautiful when the yellow flower emerges. But we all know that the "wishing flower" (as my children call it while they make a wish and blow seeds into the breeze) is not much of a flower at all. It is a weed. I was reminded of the parable of the weeds found in Matthew 13. I began thinking about how so many times in our own life, we can have a variety of beautiful flowers blooming and it can be quickly taken over by beautiful flowering weeds. The good and love and pureness of ourselves and life, of course, is the flowers – those parts of our life that a pleasing to God. But temptation and sin can often appear beautiful and easily pull us astray; these are the dandelions and flowering weeds.

This month, I would encourage you to read "The Parable of the Weeds" (Matthew 13:24-30, 36-43) and reflect on your own life. Do you have weeds taking over? How will you get rid of the weeds?
