

Lent provided an opportunity to gather in a variety of ways and times and gave us an opportunity to host Missionary Ken to hear about his work in Angola.



The final episodes of *Mister Rogers' Neighborhood* aired in 2001, so while some viewers of the film may never have watched an episode of the TV show, Mister Rogers' cultural impact remains lasting and relevant. The show and the film are built around the idea that all people deserve love, respect, and to be heard.

A BEAUTIFUL DAY IN THE NEIGHBORHOOD is based on the true story of a real-life friendship between Fred and a cynical journalist. This film poses a powerful question we could all ask of ourselves — "What if you were friends with Mister Rogers?" How would it feel to have someone genuinely care about you to the point that you were invited to explore your past wounds, in a safe environment, so that you could experience the healing and freedom found in forgiving?

In this sermon series we are going to explore how to be a neighbor with Jesus and Mr. Rogers. We will explore our feelings and why they are ok, what it means to give extravagantly, working through difficult moments in life, forgiveness and reconciliation, and practice.

Mr. Rogers modeled what it looked like to be a neighbor in the ways Jesus teaches to be a neighbor. In this new year, I hope we can truly be the neighbor's Jesus taught us to be rather than the neighbors those around us try to avoid.




YOUR MONETARY GIFTS AT WORK

The third season of the Christian year is Epiphany. January 5th, the first day of Epiphany, is called the Feast of Epiphany. Epiphant celebrates the manifestation of the divine nature of Christ to the Gentiles as represented

by the Magi. The word Epiphany comes from the Greek *epiphaneia*, meaning "revelation" or "manifestation". Epiphany begins the first Sunday in January and varies in length depending on the date set for Easter.

The liturgical color, for the first and last Sunday of Epiphany, is white, which stands for purity and holiness. The liturgical color used for the other Sunday during Epiphany is green, to signify the growing church and the spreading of the gospel. Methodists refer to the Sunday after the feast of the Epiphany and Kingdomtide, when the liturgical color is green, as Ordinary Time. The symbol of the season of Epiphany is the baptismal font, signifying the baptism of new believers in the Gospel.

2019 Report from Neighbors Helping Neighbors 12-20-2019

Neighbors Helping Neighbors has had a busy 2019, and this report will help you understand our mission on behalf of lower income families in Teton County. Our total financial assistance given through December 20th 2019 is \$28,835.21. Because of our volunteer commitment, we are proud of our low expenses, and some families continue to help us by doing small 'paybacks' or acts of kindness for others in our community. Their gifts back to NHN this year totaled \$1,080.00.

Our financial assistance for rent and mortgages totaled \$10,167.22 and helped 18 families. Utility bills; gas, electric, water, propane, and firewood totaled \$7,864.05 for 24 families. Gift cards worth \$5,385.00 helped 84 Choteau, Dutton, Fairfield, and Power families with extra food, gas, school supplies, clothes, and shoes.

Major appliances, furniture, and repair work totaling \$1,282.75 assisted 4 families. Two families received help with medical exams and glasses totaling \$709.25. We were able to buy baby wipes and diapers for the Teton County WIC program and Caring Tree, \$1,511.36. Provided one family with an activity card and sports shoes and clothes, \$304.78. We purchased tires for 1 family, \$820.00, and helped with art lessons and a workshop, \$290.80. Our one 'special project' was a donation of \$500 for the Beef to Schools Program.

NHN tries to keep updated on current resources, and our first goal is to refer families to any existing helping organizations. We receive permission from families to check references and to explore individual family budgets to look for ways to help families be sustainable. We are sorry, but NHN is not set up to handle family crisis situations.

Our sincere thanks to all the individuals and organizations who have offered donations to Neighbors Helping Neighbors, and we thank all the individuals in our community who are helping folks privately. We continue to be grateful for the generosity from our community that has given help and hope to families with challenging financial struggles.
